Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Jackson
in the State of Ohio September Term 1825

Personally appeared in open Court (this being the Court of
Records for said County) George Anthony Sen. aged 63 Years a
respectable Citizen resident in said County who being first duly
sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he now
is a resident Citizen of the County and State aforesaid and
that he was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th
day of March 1818 and that he served as a private soldier
and Trumpeter in the revolutionary war that he was enlisted
at Onseton in the State of New Jersey by Captain Pike of the
fourth Regiment of Light dragoons commanded by Colonel
Malan in June 1778 that he served in said Company
as Trumpeter from June 1778 up to the month of October
1779 and the balance of his time he served as a private soldier
and was honorably discharged by Major Bull Commandant
of said Regiment at Lancaster 26 April 1781 (a short time
before his three years (for which he was enlisted) expired which
said discharge marked (A) is herein enclosed that he was
in the battles of Springfield & Elizabethtown and in several
Skirmishes

And he doth further declare on his oath aforesaid that
since the 18th day of March 1818 he hath not by gift sale or
in any other manner disposed of his property or any part
thereof with a view or intent thereby so to diminish it
as to bring himself within the provisions of an act to
provide for certain persons engaged in the land and
naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary
War passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that
he hath not nor hath any person in trust for him any
property or securities contracts or debts due to him nor hath
he any income other than that is contained in the

Schedule hereto annexed and by him subscribed to wit
2 Cows & 2 Yearlings worth \$22.50, 8 Sheep worth each 25 \$10.00
The Irons and head of an old waggon \$15.00, 2 Iron forks .87 1/2
4 Spring calves worth \$6.00, One old horse \$12.00, One Man 25.00,
One old plough & double tree \$2.00, One barhear plough \$1.50,
2 Axes and One Iron Mace \$3.37 1/2, 3 Old hoes .75, 1 broken Ledge
50, A piece of a logchain .50, A ring & Steeple .50, 1 small
sow and six pigs \$2.50, Six other hogs \$13.00, A three year
old cott 20.00, One old saddle and bridle \$2.50, One hor 1.00,
A note on W. Poffenbarger for \$4.50, making in all \$144.00

And he the said George Anthony Sen doth further
declare on his oath that he is some indebted for articles
of subsistence for himself and family and he doth further
declare on his oath that since the 18th day of March 1818
he hath not by deed gift sale or in any other manner disposed
of any article of value to the best of his recollection excepting
the articles herein after enumerated to wit ~~some~~ having
lived some time on a farm in Indiana which he owned con-
taining about 80 acres & whilst living on it he & all his
family (which was at that time considerably large) were almost
continually sick so much so that that none of them were able
to do but very little labour and in consequence thereof the
first of April 1818 he sold his said farm to P. Hoawshinbury
for \$640.00 dollar One plough to P. Hoawshinbury for \$4. One wheel
& a reel for \$3. to P. Hoawshinbury, all of which he recd in cash - he
also sold at the same time to the persons to wit to John Ward
4 head of young cattle for 16. \$ to Peter Hoawshinbury 12 head of young
hogs for 12. \$ which he received in cash to James Union a
quantity of Pork, Wheat & corn for a horse valued at \$50.00
to Thomas Minhol 5 head of sheep for \$7. & a Kettle for 2.50 the
price

price of which he received in cash also 300 lbs of pork for 6.¢ which he rec^d in clothing for himself & family, 20 Bushells of corn to Jany Sauer McBlavagi the auctioneer of his property valued at 5.¢ out of which monies he paid \$120. dollar to Sauer Sauer, Margaret Kumbig & Robert Port debts which he had contracted with them for horses & cattle that in Sept. 1824 he sold about 103 acres of in this County to pay a debt of 200.¢ which he had contracted with one Joseph Friend previous to his moving to this state & which had not been previously paid. That in 1822 he sold beef & a beef hid to S. Perry for \$6. which he rec^d in leather & salt for the use of his family in 1825 one yoke of Oxen to One Claypool for 25.¢ in cash which he necessarily expended for articles of substance to wit clothing & necessaries & he further states upon his oath that all the money rec^d in 1818 for ^{the} property of Corn sold in Sudaanna (after paying his debts he was expended in removing his family to this state, in purchasing articles which were absolutely necessary for himself & family and in the purchase of the 103 acres of Corn mentioned above to have been sold for \$200, that all the sales of property made since the 1st of April 1818 were rendered absolutely necessary to procure a support for himself and family or to pay some just debt that he hath never spent or laid out any money or property excepting for articles which he absolutely needed and the better to satisfy the department what has become of his property he further states on his oath that he has had the misfortune to loose (by a prevailing distemper among horses & cattle) four horses & several head of cattle & sheep to the value of more than \$300. dollar.

That in 1820 he made application to the War Office
for a pension which I application was returned for
a schedule of his property but at that time although
intituled to a large amount he held in his personal
property to the value of more than \$200. and he
was advised that he could not get a pension that
he is now reduced in his property not by his negligence
but by misfortune That he is a farmer by occupation
and from age & a continued rheumatism he is
rendered incapable of labouring any longer to support
himself & family which consists of himself & a wife
61 years of age who is also past doing much labour
and who is dependant on me for a support that
in consequence of his reduced circumstances both
in property & body he applies to his country for a
support in the service of which he has spent
his better days & injured his constitution so as to
render his latter days almost intolluable.

acc^{ed} therefor are correctly stated and also that the
property mentioned as above to be now owned & possessed
by him is a correct statement & that a true valuation
thereof is made by him or at least that it is put to its
greatest value that they believe he has not squandered
his property but that it has been reduced by Misfortune
that they know he has withheld property from his
children

children who have married because he supposed
he should at some day be under the necessity of ap-
plying to his country for a support & that he would
not part with his property unless he rec^d it full
value in return

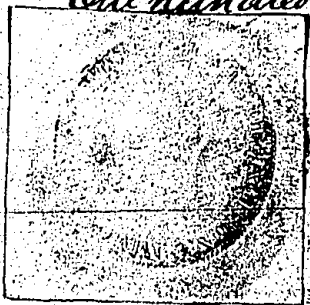



did serve in the Revolutionary war as stated in the
preceding declaration against the Common enemy
for the term of nine months under one engagement on
the continental establishment. I also certify that the
foregoing oath or affirmation and the schedule thereto
^{as well as the corroborating testimony above stated}
annexed, are truly copied from the records of the
said Court and I do further certify that it is the opinion
of the said Court that the total amount in value of
the property exhibited in the aforesaid schedule is
One hundred & forty four dollars

This Indenture made this fifth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty five between George Anthony senior of the County of Jackson and State of Ohio of the one part and David Anthony of the County of Jackson and State of Ohio aforesaid of the other part Witnesseth that the said George Anthony for and in consideration of the sum of Six hundred dollars current money of the United States of America to him in hand paid the receipt whereof he does hereby acknowledge and forever acquit and discharge the said David Anthony his heirs executors and administrators have granted bargained sold aliened and confirmed and by these presents doth grant bargain sell alien and confirm unto the said David Anthony his heirs and assigns forever all that tract or parcel of land lying and being in the County of Jackson and State of Ohio being a part of the South East Quarter of Section twenty five in Township eight of Range eighteen containing one hundred and four acres being the same more or less Together with all improvements water courses profits and appurtenances whatsoever to the said premises belonging or in anywise appertaining and the reversions remainders and profits thereof and all the estate right title interest property claim and demand of him the said George Anthony and Carter his wife of in and to the same So have and to hold the lands hereby conveyed with all and singular the premises and every part and parcel thereof with every of the appurtenances unto the said David Anthony his heirs and assigns forever to the only proper use and behoof of the said George Anthony and Carter his wife he his heirs and assigns forever and the said David Anthony for his heirs executors and administrators do covenant promise and agree to and with the said George Anthony he his heirs and assigns by these presents that the premises before mentioned now are and forever

Hereafter shall remain free of and from all former and
 other debts grants bargains sales covenants right and title
 of lawes judgments executions titles troubles charges and
 incumbrances whatsoever done or suffered to be done by
 the said George Anthony unto And the said Robert
 Anthony and his heirs all and singularly the premises hereby
 bargained and sold with the assistance unto the said
 Robert Anthony his heirs and assigns against the said
 George Anthony and his heirs and all and every other
 person or persons whatsoever doth and will warrant
 and piece defend by these presents in witness whereof
 the said George Anthony have hereunto set his hand
 and seal the day and year first above written
