State of Ohio County of Jackson Co.

On this thirtieth day of September 1825 personally appeared in open Court in the Court of Common Pleas of Jackson County Ohio being a Court of records for the County of Jackson in the State aforesaid John Euline resident in said County aged sixty six years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath ~~and~~ make the following declaration in order to obtain the pension made by the Act of Congress of the 16th of March 1818 and the 1st of May 1820 that he the said John Euline enlisted for the Term of 18 Months or about the first day of April in the year 1781 in Hampshire County in the State of Virginia in the Company commanded by Captain Thomas Kezman in the regiment commanded to the best of his memory by one Col. Gist in the line of the State of Virginia on Continental Establishment that he continued to serve in the said Company until or about the month of October 1782 when on the expiration of his 18 Month Term he was discharged from the service at Cumberland Court house in the State of Virginia that he was at the siege of Fort Mifflin and after that Summer he marched in his company with a detachment of about 800 Men (as he thinks) to Cumberland Court house Virginia after which they were marched to Charleston S. Carolina & from thence to Savannah in Georgia or near that town to a place called Westons Quins the company when they went to the south was commanded by Captain Beverly Ray and the detachment by Col. Poole after they left Virginia they

came back to Charleston South Carolina where they remained
until they were marched back to Cumberland Court House
when he received an honorable discharge from General
Chadwell he delivered his certificate of discharge to
one Charles Devil to keep ^{and that the hereby solemnly swears that he has since been lost} & that it has since been lost
and that the following are the reasons for not making
earlier application for a pension viz. that being
advanced in years and almost wholly unable to do
anything for himself he had for a number of
years past and even up to within one year past
depended upon the labour & service & assistance of his
sons Isaac & John who have now declined doing
anything for him & requiring all their exertion
to support themselves and he is now left destitute
of the means of supporting himself or family &
that this together with the exhaustion of his property
as stated below for necessities are the reasons of his
not making earlier application for a pension: and
in pursuance of the act of the 1st of May 1820 I
do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen
of the United States on the 16th day of March 1819
and that I have not since that time by gift sale or
in any manner disposed of any property or any
part thereof with intent so to diminish it as to
bring myself within the provisions of an act of
Congress entitled "An act to provide for certain persons
engaged in the land and naval service of the
United States in the Revolutionary war" passed
on

on the 15th day of March 1818 that I have not nor
 had any person in trust for me any property or
 securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I
 any income other than what is contained in the
 Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed to
 wit. 1 Mare & Colt worth \$30.00, 14 hogs 12.00, 2
 Cows 17.00, 8 Sheep 10.00, 4 chairs 1.00, 1 bedstead
 bedding 5.00, 1 Table 1.25, 1 Bed 5.00, 1 Biberwand
 3.50, 1 Kettle 1.25, 2 pots 1.50, 1 Spade 1.00, 3
 hoes 0.87 1/2, 1 Ax 1.00, 2 plows 7.50, 1 Iron 0.31 1/4,
 1 Iron wedge 0.50 & Spinning wheel 1.00 Totals
 \$96.10 ^{John Euline} which sum of \$96.10 is the whole

amount of his property at the highest cash valuation.
 And the said John Euline doth further
 state on oath to the best of his recollection & knowledge
 he has not since the 15th day of March 1818
 parted with or sold property of any kind save &
 except a Cow to Sam. Reed worth \$7.00, and Colt
 worth \$13. to Isaac Euline and Mare at \$27 dollars
 to Bookin a Colt to S. Euline for 60 Bushells of
 Corn at 15., 2 old hogs & 11 young pigs for \$4.00
 to Samuel Swinn or also as many hogs to Adam
 Long for the same sum one steer and a calf
 to Joseph Gessick for \$1.80, the whole amount
 of which said sales equal \$78.50 and all of
 them save the three last items here sold, took
 place about 4 or 5 years ago and every sale
 was rendered necessary to procure an immediate
 support and repairs for his family.

And the said Eulice doth further solemnly swear
that he is by occupation a farmer and that he is from
age and infirmity incapable any longer of labouring to
support himself and family & must suffer of course unless
he can get relief from his country in whose service he
has toiled; he states he has a family consisting of a
wife and one child whom he has to support the child
is afflicted with fits and totally unable to do anything
for himself

Dear Madam:

I advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 42715, it appears that John Erlins (the name does not appear as Erlins) enlisted in Hampshire County, Virginia about April 1, 1781, served in Captains Thomas Womack's and Beverly Bay's Companies, Colonel Gist's and Posey's Virginia Regiments, was in the Siege of Yorktown and was discharged about October, 1782. His rank is not stated.

He was allowed pension as a private on his application awarded September 30, 1825 at which time he was a resident of Jackson County, Ohio and aged sixty-six years. The date of his birth and the names of his parents are not shown. He stated that he was by occupation a farmer.

At the time of making his application he stated that his family consisted of his wife and one child, but did not give their names, and referred to his sons Isaac and John. There are no further family data.

The above noted is the only soldier surname Erlins or Erlins that is found on the Revolutionary War records of this Bureau. The War of 1812 records fail to show that pension was ever claimed on account of the services of David, Jacob, George, John or Henry Erlins or Erlins.

Your letter requesting information relative to a soldier

of the Civil War has been referred to the proper division of this
bureau for reply.
