before me, a *Justice of the Peace* within and for the County and State aforesaid, per-
sonally came *Mary Horton* widow of *Joseph Horton* deceased resident of said County, who

being duly sworn according to law, ~~in her oath and says~~ *upon her oath make*
the following declaration for the purpose of obtaining the ~~benefit of the act of Congress approved 3rd February 1853~~
who ~~claims a Revolutionary Pension, under the act of Congress of~~ *to wit,*

That she is the widow of Joseph Horton late of Jackson
County, Ohio deceased, who was a private in the
Cavalry 2^d Regt. Militia in the war of the Revolution, and
a pensioner under the act of June 7th 1832.

That she was married to the
said Joseph Horton at Jeroto County, Ohio on or
about the 4th day of July, A.D. 1828

That the said Joseph
Horton died in said Jackson Co.
the 11th day of June 1839 and that she
married but still remains the widow of ~~Joseph Horton~~

she further states that by reason of old age and
consequent infirmities she is not able to go before
the Probate Court and also that she know of no record
evidence of her said marriage

Mary Horton
makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the arrears of Pension due ~~under said act of~~
or other act of Congress which
may be applicable, and refers to ~~declaration and the evidence in support of the same, on file in the Pension Office.~~

The notes and the regulations will shew what is necessary to be done. You will, when you return your papers to this Department, send this printed letter with them; and you will, by complying with this request, greatly facilitate the investigation of your claim.

benefit of the Act of Congress, passed June 7th 1832.

~~State of Ohio~~ Jackson County, ~~Ohio~~ On the 18th day of March 1832

personally appeared in open Court, before the Judge
of the Court of Common Pleas & now sitting
at ^{Wesley} Weston, a resident of Jefferson Township, in
Jackson County, Ohio, aged about seventy three
years, who being first duly sworn according
to law, doth on his oath make the following
Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
the Act of Congress, passed June 7th 1832 -

That he entered the service of the United States
under the following named Officers and served
as here in stated - That some time in the year
1779, when he resided in Augusta Co. Va. he
volunteered in a Militia Company commanded
by Capt. James Tate, who was under the
Command of Major George Morford - That
his Company & two others under the com-
mand of said Major were raised for
the special purpose of going against the
savages and guarding the frontier - That
they marched from James Augusta
to Greenbrier Co. to a place called the
Savannah Post, where he thinks he
served at least two months, when he
was dismissed, without any writing
or receipt of - That some time
in the ^{fore part of the} month of March 1781, at August Co.
Va. when he still resided, he volunteered
in the Company of Militia commanded
by Capt. Alexander Seaford, who was under
the Command of Col. Lamb. McDowell - That
he marched thro' the Counties of Rockbridge,
Botetourt, Bedford, Pittsylvania & into
Guilford in North Carolina - That he
was in the battle of Guilford Court House,
except he thinks on the 15th March 1781

where he was taken prisoner by the British - that
he was marched as a prisoner to Wilmington
where he was kept ~~for a long time~~
~~for a long time~~ for a long time prisoner
and until he escaped and returned home
on the 8th day of July following -

That a few days after he returned home,
he again volunteered for in a company of Mo-
nited militia commanded by Capt. Samuel
M. Cutchin, who was under the command
of Col. Bowyer of Augusta, that they marched
to ^{Logans} Jamestown, and ~~was~~ had a small
engagement at place called Hot Water,
which lasted about half an hour - that
after a service of twenty days, he was dismissed,
and returned home - That after words and some
time in the spring of the year 1862, at Staunton in Augusta Co. Va.
he enlisted for three years or for during the war, in the
company commanded by Capt. Labrum, who was
under the command of Genl. Amung; ~~and~~ that
he was a member of a Horse Company attached
to said General's ^{independent} corp - they went west from Staunton
to Winchester, from which place after a few
months, the exact time not recollected, they
marched to Little York, where after a service
of sixteen or seventeen months, under said Lieutenant,
he was discharged, by writing, which he is now
unable to produce, ~~it~~ not having been ^{was} among
his papers for forty five years past - That during
this period he was in no considerable battle -
That he has no documentary evidence of his
said service, & that he knows of no person on
whose testimony he can proceed, who can
testify to his service, excepting the testimony
of Jonathan Millhollen, who served in the
same company with him during his abs.
& whose affidavit accompanies this petition.
Understand - He here by relinquishes every
claim whatsoever to a Pension, except the

the present and declares ^{his name} that ^{is not on}
 the Pension Roll of the agency of any State.
 That he was born in England and
 emigrated to this country ~~in 1780~~
 after the commencement of the
 Revolutionary War ^{was} ~~in~~ ^{an} ~~army~~ ^{army} called the
 Potomac, built on the Potomac River.
 He has no record of his age; that he
 resided in Augusta Co. Va. until about
 1795 or 1796, when he
 moved to Greenbrier Co. Va. where
 he resided for six or seven years, when
 he moved to Kanawha Co. Va. where
 he resided for about the same length
 of time, when he moved to Ohio to
 the same neighborhood in Jackson
 Co. where he now resides, where he
 has resided for about ten years.

Horton, aged 63 years, a resident
of Scioto County in the State of Ohio, who
being duly sworn according to law, de-
clares that she is the widow of
Joseph Horton deceased, who
was a Private of Cavalry, in the Rev-
olutionary war - That the particulars
of his service she cannot tell, but for
proof thereof refers to the records of the
Department - and for proof of her
marriage, of his death, and the
other facts necessary to establish this
case she refers to her declaration
and the accompanying documents
which she made in order to procure
a pension under the Act of 3^d February
1853, as also to her certificate of
Pension now in her possession -
bearing date at the Department
of the Interior the 27 day of December
A.D. 1854, and signed by R. W. McClellan

Secretary of the Interior allowing
her a Pension from the 3^d day of Feb-
ruary 1853, during her life.

She further states that she is now
a widow.

She makes this declaration
for the purpose of obtaining the
bounty land to which she may
be entitled under the Act approved
March 3. 1853.

Sir:

I advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 7777, it appears that Joseph Horton was born in England, date not stated, and came to America after the commencement of the Revolution, on a ship named "Potomac".

While living in Augusta County, Virginia he enlisted in 1779 and served two months as a private in Captain James Tate's Company under Major George Morford in the Virginia Troops.

He enlisted in March 1781, served as a private in Captain Alexander Telford's Company, Colonel Samuel McDowell's Virginia Regiment, was at the battle of Guilford where he was taken prisoner and held until he made his escape and returned home July 8, 1781.

He enlisted in July 1781 and served twenty days as a private in Captain Samuel McCutcheon's Company, Colonel Bowyer's Virginia Regiment, and was at the battle of Hot Water.

He enlisted in the spring of 1782 and served sixteen or seventeen months as a private in Captain Lebrun's Company, Colonel Armand's Corps.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 18, 1832 while living in Jefferson Township, Jackson County, Ohio aged seventy-three years. He died June 11, 1833, in Jefferson Township, Jackson County, Ohio.

Soldier married July 4, 1824 in Scioto County, Ohio, Mary Jenkins. She was allowed pension on her application executed February 12, 1853 while living in Scioto County, Ohio, aged eighty-one years.

There are no further family data on file.
