The State of Ohio Jackson County fo.

On the 27th day of June 1821 personally appeared in open Court being the Court of Common Pleas and Court of Record for the County of Jackson aforesaid agreeable to the Statute in that case made and provided ~~and~~ William Clark aged sixty two years who being first duly sworn according to law with on his oath declared that he is a resident Citizen of the County of Jackson and State of Ohio aforesaid and that he served the United States in the Revolutionary War as follows, viz; 3 years in the 1st Regiment of Artillery, of the Virginia line, commanded by Col. Thomas Marshall, was in the battle at Hampton against the British & in North Carolina when Col. Bluford was defeated. And that pursuant to an act of Congress passed on the 18th day of March 1816 I made application about the 24 day of August 1819 & obtained a pension certificate No. 15126, dated the 1st day of October 1819, reserving me on the pension roll of the Ohio Agency at \$8 per month and I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1816 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any other manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "The act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United States in the Revolutionary War passed on the 18th day of March 1816" and that I have not nor has any

any person in trust for me any property, or securities
 contracts or debts due to me nor have any income
 other than what is contained in the schedule here to
 annexed and by me subscribed. to wit;

State of Ohio 105

On the twenty fourth day of August Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and before me the subscriber President of the Council of Commerce of the second, came William Clarke who after being duly sworn, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and marine service of the United States in revolutionary war, deposed and said that he is in his sixty first year of his age, that he now resides in Jackson County State of Ohio entitled in August - seventeen hundred seventy seven for three years in Hanover County State of Virginia in the company of Captain Moody, in first regiment of infantry of Virginia line or continental establishment, and served during said three years in said regiment but was detached from Broadbent's company to Colson's, and during his service in said corps, marched in April 1780 to the south, was only in an action when the British burnt workshops at Hampton Virginia ^{before marching to south} that the year last mentioned he received his discharge in that regiment commanded by Thomas Marshall, at Dickson's Virginia in August 1780. after the 20th of that month, but it is lost, that this applicant is in reduced circumstances and needs the assistance of the country for support and that he has no other income in his possession or power of sale.

I, **John Thompson** President of within mentioned de-
partment that applicant **William Clarke** since in revolutionary
war agreeing to preceding declaration, upwards of nine months
in continuation, on the continental establishment against the com-
mon enemy, and I am satisfied that said applicant needs the
assistance of his country for support, and I now transmit the
testimony and proceedings had before me to War Department
by the direction of Statute and instructions of said department.

On the ~~twenty~~ ^{twenty} ninth day of June A.D. 1849, personally appeared before the Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of the County aforesaid, in open Court, ^{Nancy} Ann Andrews, a resident of Scioto Township in the County of Jackson aforesaid, aged seventy years, who being duly sworn according to Law, doth on her oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed July 29th 1848. ~~William~~ ^{William} Clarke who was a private in the Virginia Line, served in said line for three years from 1777. She further declares ~~that~~ she was married to the said William Clarke ^{or about} on the ~~day~~ ^{day} of September in the year seventeen hundred and ninety four, that her husband the aforesaid William Clarke, died on the ~~twenty~~ ^{twenty} ninth day of March in the year eighteen hundred and twenty seven that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the second of January eighteen hundred, viz. at the time above stated. She further swears that she is now a widow, and that she has never before made any application for a pension.

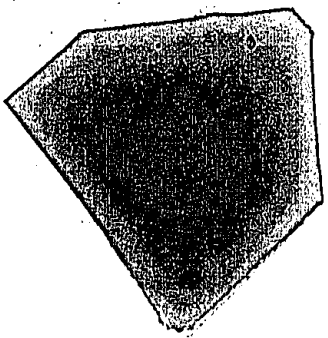

aforesaid Nancy Ann Woodcock, a resident of
Jackson County aforesaid aged 70 years
who being duly sworn according to law declares
that she is the widow of Mr. Black (as also of James Woodcock
deceased who was a private in _____ in the
Revolutionary War.

That she was married to the said Mr.
Black in _____ about the year
1795 and that her name before said marriage
was Nancy Ann Williams that her said husband died
in Jackson Co. Ohio on the _____ day of _____ 18____
next before mentioned by her in her declaration for pension
that she is not now married but still remains
his widow. She is unable to state or ^{the Company} regiment in
which her said husband served.

_____ but for proof of his
service refers to his declaration which he made to
obtain pension, and for proof of her marriage and
his death and of other facts necessary to establish
this claim she refers to her declaration to obtain
pension under the act of 29th Feb'y 1848
as also to her certificate of Pension now in her posses-
sion, dated the 19th day of April Eighteen hundred
and fifty _____ and numbered _____ signed
by J. Erving Secretary of the Interior and granted

her a Pension under the act of 29th July 1848
at the rate of Thirty Six Dollars a year from the

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter, addressed to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, this city, which has been forwarded to this office, in which you request the Revolutionary War record of William Clark, born August 3, 1745, probably in Ireland, married Ann-----, and died May 1, 1819, in Virginia.

There is no claim for pension on file based upon the services in the Revolutionary War of a William Clark, identical with your description. The record of a William Clark, who served from Virginia, and whose wife was Nancy Ann Williams, has been found and is furnished you herein, the data for which were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, 7.1694, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War. It is hoped that this record will be of assistance to you in your research.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of William Clark are not shown.

William Clark enlisted in Hanover County, Virginia, in August, 1777, served in Captains Moody's and Johnson's Companies of Virginia Artillery, was in an engagement at Hampton and at Buford's Retreat and was discharged about August 20, 1780, by Colonel Thomas Marshall.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 24, 1819, at which time he was aged sixty years and resided in Jackson County, Ohio.

The soldier married in September, 1794, Nancy Ann Williams. The marriage bond was dated at Stafford County, Virginia, as of September 3, 1794. One Leonard Clark signed the marriage bond; no relationship to William was shown.

William Clark died March 29, 1827, in Jackson County, Ohio.

and his widow, Nancy Ann Clark, married in September, 1835, James Andrews, who died April 5, 1844.

Nancy Ann Andrews was allowed pension on account of the services of her former husband, William Clark, on her application executed June 29, 1849, at which time she was a resident of Scioto Township, Jackson County, Ohio and gave her age as seventy years. In 1855, she stated that she was aged seventy years no explanation for this discrepancy in age was stated.

It was stated that William and Nancy Ann Clark had children in 1821, soldier referred to his daughter, aged thirteen years, but he did not give her name and no names of any other children are given.

In 1821, one Nathaniel W. Andrews was clerk of the court for Jackson County, Ohio. No relationship to James Andrews who married Nancy Ann Clark, was stated.
