Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed
June 7th 1832.

State of Ohio Jackson County, O.

On this second day of April Anno Domini Eighteen
hundred and thirty three, personally appeared in open
Court before the judges of the Court of Common Pleas now
sitting, William Crow a resident of Clinton Township
in the State and County aforesaid, aged about seventy five
years, who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth
on his oath make the following Declaration in order to
obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June
7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States
under the following named Officers and served as herein
stated to wit: That he entered as a Volunteer for
three months under the Command of Captain John
Hopkins in Rockingham County Virginia he thinks
in the year 1779, attached to the Regiment commanded
by Colonel Nawl and Major Guy Hamilton, and was
marched to Richmond Virginia, but was in no service
during said Term - That some months afterwards
the said Crow entered as a Volunteer for three months
under the Command of Captain George Baxter at
Rockingham County Virginia, and attached to the Regiment
commanded by Col. Nawl, and was marched to Bottoms
Bridge and joined Head Quarters, where Col. Nawl
was discharged, and the Regiment was commanded
by Col. Park and was then marched to Suffolk and
from thence to Long Bridge, and continued in Winter
Quarters for about six weeks, and marched back to
Head Quarters at Bottoms Bridge, and this service
having expired, was discharged.

And about four weeks afterwards, the said Crow entered the service as a Volunteer for the term of three months in the County Rockingham Virginia in the Company Commanded by Captain Logan, and was marched to Richmond Virginia, and in a few weeks was dismissed on account as was alleged, that there was no call for the service at that time. — But shortly after the said Crow returned home, there was a call for the Militia and he again entered the service as a substitute for three months under the command of Captain Richard Ragen at Rockingham County Virginia, and was marched to a place called Allens Orney where the Company remained for some weeks and until the arrival of the French Army commanded by the Marquis De la Fayette, that the said Company in which the said Crow was a substitute was attached to the French Army three miles below Williamsburg where a part of Washingtons army then were, and were marched to Little York where he the said Crow assisted in the Capture of Cornwallis, and having been four months in the service this time he was marched back to Rockingham County Virginia and discharged and the said Crow upon his oath states that he has no Documentary evidence of his service, nor does he know of any other evidence that is herein enclosed, whose testimony he can procure, who can testify of his service. —

And He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or Annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of

And the said Court do hereby declare their opinion after an investigation of the matter, and after putting the allegations embodied at the end of the general Declaration, presented by the War Department that the above named applicant was a Revolutionary Soldier, and David as he states, And the Court further Certifies, that it appears to them that Edward Reynolds and that William Reed who have also signed the same issue, residents in the State of Ohio & County of Jackson are Credible persons, and that their statements are entitled to credit

a Justice of the Peace in the County aforesaid William Crow
who being duly sworn, deposeth and saith that, by reason
of old age, and the consequent loss of memory, he cannot swear
positively as to the precise length of his service in the third
term of service under the command of Captains Boggs (as
set forth in a declaration signed by me and sent to the department
of war for a pension in conformity with the Act of June 7th
1832) but according to the best of his recollection, he served not
less than the periods mentioned below as a private in
Captain Boggs Company First Twenty one days (I make
this estimate of time from the length of the road from
Rockingham County to Richmond Va. and home again
about 270 miles being at Richmond both a short time)
and for such service I claim a pension.

On this 20th day of July, A.D. 1835, before me the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace for the said County of Peoria, personally appeared William Crow, who under oath declares that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the Company commanded by Captain Richard Rogers, in the ~~Army~~ ^{Army} commanded by Colonel Parker in the service of the United States, that his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of Ohio, from which he has lately removed, that he now resides in the State of Illinois, and wishes his pension to be there payable, in future. The following are his reasons for removing from the State of Ohio, to wit, He could not earn twenty five cents a day there it is a poor place to live in, he can make a living as a peep show here than there. His son James Crow was coming out here and he thought he would come with him.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to William Crow who served in the Revolutionary War and was buried in Jackson County, Ohio.

The record of William Crow which follows was obtained from pension claim, S.52196, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War. This is the record of the only William Crow or Crowe, found on file in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

William Crow was born in Rockingham County, Virginia, date not given, nor are the names of his parents shown.

While residing in Rockingham County, he volunteered about the year 1779, served three months as private in Captain John Hopkins' company, Colonel Nawl's Virginia regiment. He later served three months as private in Captain George Baxter's company, Colonel Nawl's and Darke's regiments, about twenty-one days in Captain Oger's company, and four months in Captain Richard Ragen's company; during this last tour, he was at the capture of Cornwallis. Definite dates of service not given.

After the Revolution, William Crow lived ~~two~~ years at the "Point" in Mason County, Virginia, and four or five years in Gallia County, Ohio.

The soldier, William Crow, was allowed pension on his application executed April 2, 1833, then living in Clinton Township, Jackson county, Ohio, then aged about seventy-five years.

On July 20, 1833 he stated that he had "lately removed" from Ohio and was then living in Illinois, where he had come with his son,

James Crow. In 1833 William Crow was living near the town of Peoria, Illinois. He died January 23, 1834.

The papers in this claim contain no further reference to his family.
